Item A LARGE REGENCY OVERMANTEL GLASS IN THE ROMAN TASTE

Attributed to Thomas Fentham (1774-1825), the Strand, London.

Description

The mercury plate supported in a rectangular frame, formed as a pair of staved columns, ornamented with Medusa plaques and urn capitals; the inverted breakfront cornice with a central eagle, flanked by recumbent lions; the surface revealing some original paint, gesso and gilded decoration; small losses.

This large overmantel glass, which most unusually retains layers of polychrome decoration and gesso with traces of gilding, may be attributed to Thomas Fentham (1774-1825) the leading looking glass and picture frame-maker in the Strand, on the basis of extant mirrors with similar detail and scale, (see Geoffrey Beard & Christopher Gilbert, The Dictionary of English Furniture Makers 1660-1840, 1986, p. 296 and Christopher Gilbert, Pictorial Dictionary of Marked London Furniture 1700-1840, 1996, p.204, fig. 344). It is conceived in a particular Roman taste, suggesting a lost neo-classical commission; the frame ornamented with recumbent lions and Medusa masks³, ribbon-wrapped fasces, the bound bundles of birch rods carried in the manner of flags representing the Republic, and an imperial eagle¹ looking sideways with outstretched wings, the latter following designs published in CH Tatham's Etchings ..., 1799. Fentham supplied an illustrious clientele including the 3rd Earl of Egremont (West Sussex Record Office, PHA/7557, 8056), Charles Townley, Lady Heathcote and Philip Yorke for his Park Lane house, from which items survive at Erddig, Denbighshire, (see 'Erddig', Country Life, 16 August 1930, p.211).
